Choral Spring Concert


Have nothing to do on Wednesday June 3rd? No y problem! At 7:30 pm, AWMS will be

Comparing Wearable Tech There have been many new releases of wearable tech. Samsung, Motorola, LG, and even Apple has released their own watches/ wearable technology. With all of these new watches, people are having a hard time deciding which kind to get. All four of these companies' watches have their ups and downs.

The Apple watch seems to be not as good as the others. It has a square shape appearance and is fully equipped with IOS. It only weighs 1.41 ounces, so it is not like having a rock on your arm. Apple has not released its battery and storage information. One other bad thing is its price which starts at \$349.99.

Human Cloning: Is it possible? Is it right? Is it Worth it?

As the future becomes the present, ideas spoken only in science fiction movies are now becoming the reality. Dolly the sheep was the first animal to be scientifically cloned in 1996. It will almost be 20 years since the first animal was cloned, and scientists have been experimenting on cloning ever since. The question is can we clone humans?

The short answer: No. "Nobody in their right mind would want to do that," said John Gearhart, the director for the institute for Regenerative Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania. It might be possible, but we might never know. The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops saw the exponential development of cloning in the past few years, and they were concerned. As a result, they banned all research on human embryos, even if they would be destroyed in the process of research. There are also other factors acting as roadblocks from cloning a human. Studies done previously in the Oregon Health and Science University showed defects in embryos, even as soon as they are a 100 cell mass. When doing this, a few genes go wrong, and don't work, preventing us from making a real, healthy human clone... (To read Robit's full article, visit the website: awactionnews.weebly.com)-
